

 - open-minded contributors and reviewers
 - multiple specific volunteer efforts
 - support teams (Secretariat, RFC Editor, IANA)

 - if we seek individual or corporate advantage in the IETF, we will surely fail.

My goals (1)

- Make the IESG able to steer
 - WGs should take responsibility for quality of output
 - IESG needs to be able to set directions
- Make the IAB able to do architecture within the IETF
- Make the administrative restructuring work
- Focus on improving IETF process
 - Internal workflow, tools, education, process
 - External IANA, RFC Editor
- Focus on vital liaison relations
 - Cooperate rather than competing with other bodies
